Breastfeeding practices in Virginia

Strengths

- Percent of hospitals providing prenatal breastfeeding instruction: 100 percent
- Percent of facilities where staff offer patients advice and counseling on breastfeeding: 96 percent

Weaknesses

- Percent of hospitals that adhere to practice guidelines against routinely supplementing infant feeding with formula, glucose water or water: 30 percent
- Percent of hospitals where healthy, full-term infants room-in with mother at least 23 hours per day during hospital stay: 14 percent
- Percent of hospitals with comprehensive breastfeeding policies: 13 percent
- Percent of hospitals that provide post-hospital support, including a phone call to the new mother at home, referral to community breastfeeding support and the opportunity for a follow-up visit: 14 percent

Based on a random survey of households with children age 19-35 months. Surveyors asked if the child was ever

breastfed or fed breast milk, and how long.

U.S.: ever breastfed 74.6 percent; breastfeeding at six months 44.3 percent

Virginia: ever breastfed 79.1 percent; breastfeeding at six months 40.8 percent
